
Our Clean Church

Did you know that Jesus had 6, yes 6, trials?

A note from Sandy:

While doing some research about Holy Week, I found several articles about Jesus having 6 trials. I couldn't believe it. I hope you find this as incredible as I did. My thanks to Chuck Swindoll and Steve Rudd from whose articles I gleaned the following.

According to the Gregorian calendar, the arrest and trials of Jesus took place on April 6th, 32 AD during a **9-hour** period.

Here is the cast of characters:

Judas The disciple who betrayed Jesus

Jesus The Son of God and the sacrificial

Lamb

Annas The lifetime appointed Jewish high

priest (and "retired")

Caiaphas Annas' son-in-law and Roman

appointed Jewish high priest

The

Sanhedrin The Jewish "Supreme Court"

Pilate The Roman Governor

Herod The ruler of the Galilee region

It had been an eventful week for Jesus. There was the triumphant entry into Jerusalem on the back of a colt. The cursing of the fig tree. He wept over Jerusalem and cleared the temple.

Now, supper was over - the Last Supper. Jesus was in the Garden of Gethsemane, praying. God's plan was enfolding as Judas came into the garden with a group of soldiers. He walked to Jesus and kissed him on the cheek. Although the soldiers expected a fight or for Jesus to run, he did not. The arrest took place between **1 and 2 a.m.**

The soldiers bound Jesus and took Him to Annas. It is not known why He was taken there, for at this time, Annas had no power as High Priest. Annas had been replaced by Caiaphas, his son-in-law by the Roman government. However, Annas was ecstatic that, finally, Jesus was going to get what was coming to Him for humiliating him, the overseer of the temple

bazaar, when He cleared the temple. Jesus, hands tied behind his back, was struck repeatedly by his guards and then was hauled off to Caiaphas. This was his first trial and Annas judged him guilty.

Caiaphas had gotten together a group of chief priests, elders and scribes. It was about **3:30 a.m.** when Jesus was brought before them. Caiaphas knew this was illegal because it was dark, this was a preliminary hearing, they are in the wrong place - his house, not the council chamber. But he went ahead with the farce.

The witnesses that Caiaphas had gathered contradicted one another. So, Caiaphas did the illegal act of questioning Jesus. He asked Jesus if He was the Christ, the Son of the Blessed. Jesus responded, "I am."

With that, Caiaphas rent his clothes and said, "What need we of any more witnesses?" And now, instead of taking a vote as prescribed by Jewish law, he asked, "What think ye?" They all condemned Jesus. With that, Jesus was spit upon, His face was covered, He was beat with their fists and He was mocked. By the time this "trial" was over, Jesus was bleeding and bruised and still, no official verdict had been handed down. It was during this trial that Peter denied knowing Jesus.

The third and final Jewish trial was before the Sanhedrin at around **6 a.m.** Roman law would recognize only their verdict. It was the shortest trial and Jesus was found guilty of blasphemy. Since that would not stand up in a Roman court, the charge was changed to treason. They claimed that Jesus was attempting to overthrow the government. He was sent to Pilate in the hall of judgment between **6:30 - 7:00 a.m.**

Jewish law prohibited Jews from entering a Gentile court during Passover so Pilate came out to them. He asked what the charge was and was answered that if Jesus wasn't guilty they wouldn't have brought Him to him. Pilate said that Jesus should be judged then by Jewish law. But, Pilate! It is not lawful for us to put a man to death and besides Jesus was in the process of overthrowing the government.

Pilate asked Jesus if He was indeed the King of the Jews. Jesus wanted to know if it was Pilate asking for himself or was that what he was told. Pilate looked at Him, "Am I a Jew? Your own nation and the High Priests brought you to me. What did you do? Are you trying to

overthrow the government?"

After much back and forth, Pilate took Jesus back to the crowd and told them that he could not find any fault with Jesus. Can't you just see the crowd throwing up their hands and shaking their heads? What was it going to take to kill this man? They became more fierce, shouting that Jesus was stirring up the people by preaching nonsense from Galilee to Jerusalem.

Pilate heard "Galilee" and knew he'd found the answer to his problem. He would send him to the ruler of that area, Herod who just happened to be in Jerusalem. Thus, ended the 4th trial around **7:00 a.m.** - not guilty.

Herod was delighted to see his lifelong enemy before him. Remember Herod was the one who had John the Baptist beheaded and dealt with vicious cruelty over his subjects. He looked at Jesus as a magician. He wanted to see Jesus do a trick.

You do not see, in any of the gospels, where Jesus responded to Herod in any way. There were no proceedings. Herod wanted a court jester. Because Jesus would not cooperate, Herod and company mocked Him, dressed Him in a beautiful robe and sent Him back to Pilate. Fifth trial done.

Around **7:30 a.m.**, Pilate looks out his window and saw Jesus coming back, bound and robed as a king. It was obvious that Herod was not in cooperative mood. Pilate's heart probably sank. He thought he'd rid himself of the problem. This whole event, however, brought Pilate and Herod together as friends.

Pilate did not want to declare Jesus guilty. He tried several ways to get out of that guilty verdict. He first offered to chastise and beat Jesus and then release Him. The answer was a resounding "No!"

The second effort to release Jesus was through a custom where a prisoner was released on the Passover. Pilate believed that if he presented Barabbas beside Jesus, Jesus would be released.

Barabbas was in prison waiting for his sentence to be carried out - death by crucifixion. He was a very bad man. A murderer. A insurrectionist. Guilty of sedition. He had committed capital crimes.

Caiaphas' plan backfired. He offered to release one of the prisoners. The crowd demanded that Barabbas be released and Jesus




crucified. A band of soldiers stripped Jesus, put a scarlet robe on Him, a crown of thorns was placed on his head and a reed put in His right hand. The soldiers mocked Him by bowing down, saying "Hail the King of the Jews!" He was struck on the head, spit upon, and led away to be crucified.

Jesus was on the cross between the 2 thieves by **9:00 a.m.**
