Pastor's Corner

I don't know how many of you are Jimmy Buffett fans. For those of you who are, perhaps you can introduce those who aren't to the Parrothead philosophy of life.

In the meantime, I want to share part of a song of his I ran across recently:

I bought a cheap watch from a crazy man Walking down Canal.

It doesn't use numbers or moving hands, It always just says, "Now."

Now you may be thinking that I was had, But this watch is never wrong. And if I have trouble, the warranty says: "Breathe in. Breath out. Move on."

Breathe in. Breathe out. Move on.

It's a *pithy* phrase, in the truest sense of the word: *A phrase or statement that is brief but full of substance and meaning.*

For over 2500 years, the breath has been at the center of mindfulness meditation. Modern medicine is just now beginning to recognize the demonstrable benefits of mindful breathing to human health and well-being. It is a key component in treatments for anxiety, depression, and post-traumatic stress disorders.

This is not some new fad or new-age belief system. It is both ancient wisdom and modern scientific observation. And surprisingly, perhaps, it is inherently present within our Christian faith.

There is no distinct term for "spirit" in either the Old or New Testaments. The concept is expressed by the metaphorical use of the Hebrew, *ruach*, or Greek, *pneuma*, both of which literally mean *breath* or *wind*. The English word *spirit* is simply the Anglicized version of the Latin word for "breath," *spiritus*. So quite literally, the Old and New Testaments both understand spirit, breath, and wind (an invisible movement) to be essentially the same. In the very beginning, it was God's *ruach* that moved over the unformed creation. Was it God's Spirit, or God's breath, or a wind from God? Yes. It was all of them. Is the third Person of the Trinity God's Spirit, or God's breath, or a wind from God? Yes. It is all of them.

A human being at rest takes approximately 22,000 breaths per day (I wonder who was the lucky one who got to count these for the first time?). 22,000 times per day, we encounter the *ruach*, the *pneuma*, that literally keeps us alive. When we are anxious or stressed, the rate of those encounters increases. What if we could understand even a fraction of those to be not simply an exchange of oxygen for carbon dioxide, but the sustaining presence of the Spirit/Breath/Wind of God?

As long as we are living, our breath is <u>always</u> with us, <u>always</u> available to remind us that God's *ruach*, the *pneuma* of Christ, is always moving around and within us, sustaining us, energizing us, calming and calling us into God's presence.

Breathe in. Breathe out.

Move on, confident of Christ's presence around and within you.


Make peace.

Originally known Decoration as Dav. Memorial Day began with

an idea from General John Logan as a way to honor the fallen soldiers of the Civil War. The first celebration on May 30, 1868, was held at Arlington National Cemetery with a crowd of 5,000 people decorating the graves of over 20,000 military personnel with flowers. Most experts believe General Logan planned the first Decoration Day for that day because Northern and Southern states would have flowers in bloom by then, though others believe the date was ideal because it didn't coincide with the anniversary of any battles.

Various Washington officials, including General Ulysses S. Grant, presided over the ceremonies. After speeches, children from the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphan Home, among others, made their way through the cemetery, strewing flowers on both Union and Confederate graves, reciting prayers, and singing hymns. Many also came prepared with a picnic lunch.

It wasn't until after World War I that Memorial Day was expanded to honor all veterans who died in any American war. In 1971, Decoration Day became officially known as Memorial Day and Congress passed an act declaring it a national holiday. That same year, Memorial Day was moved from May 30 to the last Monday in May by President Lyndon B. Johnson. "This will ... enable families who live some distance apart to spend more time together," President Johnson noted in his official statement regarding what is now known as the Uniform Monday Holiday Act.
